A NOTE ABOUT THE SHOW

A note about the language in the show. There's no way to sugar coat it. Weller Martin curses like a sailor. He is a man of a certain generation, and doesn't make any excuses for it. If you are someone who doesn't appreciate a salty tongue, like me, I look to Fonsia Dorsey who is the foil to Weller's dirty mouth. I weigh everything within the context of the show. The language remains intact because that is who Weller is as a character, and there is really no way around it. It is not meant to shock, but to give an honest and human portrayal of his character.

The Gin Game is performed with a 15 minute intermission and runs approximately 90 minutes.

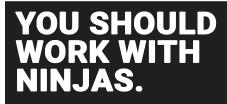

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A LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

"Loneliness" says Weller Martin, "it's as simple as that," is one of the opening lines of *The Gin Game*, and for me, is ultimately the thesis. If we live long enough in The United States there's a pretty decent chance that we will end up in a facility like Bentley Home where Weller Martin and Fonsia Dorsey find themselves in *The Gin Game*. Even though I am in my thirties, my father was born in 1936, and a few years ago, because of failing health, and a Dementia diagnosis, my family made the wrenching decision to move him from his home to a local care facility. He did not want to go, and for years after, he repeatedly pleaded with us to go home, to buy a car so he could leave, to go anywhere but the static, monotonous environment we had placed him in. And like Fonsia's son and family members, no matter how much we tried to make time to visit my dad, it was never enough.

The environment of nursing home facilities (at least for those with limited income) is not a welcoming environment for their residents, employees, or guests. They are seemingly designed to dissuade you from spending too much time there, when all their residents have is time. To add insult to injury, unless you are a person of means (like those who can afford to live at the Presbytarian Home in the play), these facilities will drain your remaining savings and income. What is left for these residents then? In the absence of independence, family, and financial resources, all that remains is the facility, and the people in it. And that is the sliver of hope we find here in *The Game*. Weller and Fonsia befriend each other against all odds. They share their stories, their triumphs, their pain and losses. They find confidants in one another all over a game of cards, but running beneath the surface of this innocent game is that looming loneliness, and the pressure and longing that every human experiences in trying to connect with another human being. And many times we fail miserably in those quests.

Like my father, and I am sure, many of yours, Weller is hesitant to express emotion or weakness. He would rather express himself through playing cards and bluster. Fonsia, on the other hand, while much better at conversation, is also struggling with certain aspects of pride; parts of her life she would prefer to hide, or even keep secret. These very real human flaws are what stand in the way of Weller and Fonsia deepening their relationship, but are also what make this play continually relevant.

I've been thinking a lot in recent years about the importance of catharsis in theatre. It is something that we are losing touch of in favor of lighter fare and escapist entertainment. I love a good farce as much as the next person, but what separates comedy from tragedy in its ability to provide catharsis. When Weller makes his final exit at the end of the play, Fonsia utters "oh no". It is perhaps the most powerful "oh no" in theatre history, and can be interpreted many ways.

What has been lost at the end of *The Gin Game*? What have these characters lost? What have we lost? And, what can we do as a society to ensure that those in care facilities still have a voice? I hope that these are the conversations you will partake in at the end of the play. The late, great Leonard Cohen once sang "take this longing". In the end, when all else is stripped away, what we are left with is longing—longing for human connection, longing to be heard just once more.

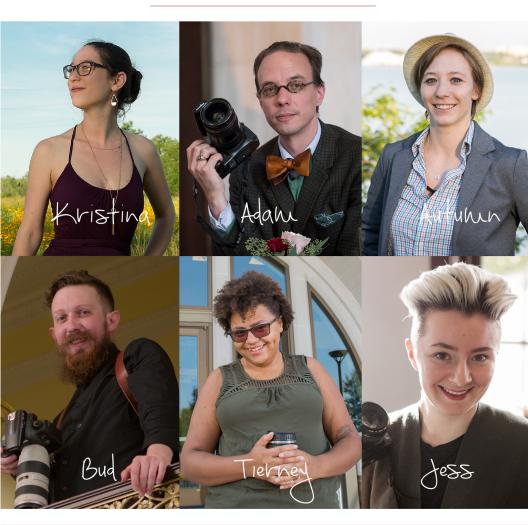


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WHO'S WHO | PRODUCTION STAFF

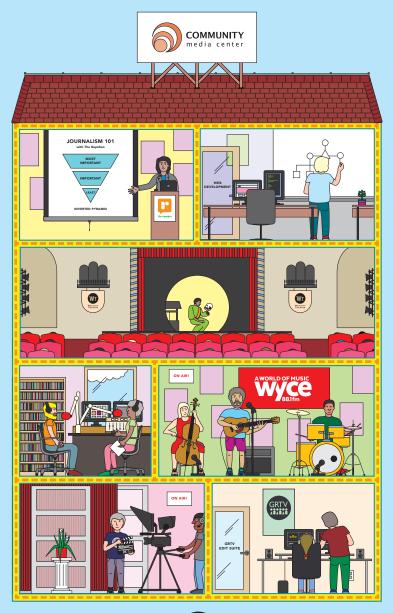
