



ABOUT RAINEYS BOTTOM

AUGUST WILSON



Born on April 27, 1945, August Wilson grew up in Pittsburgh's predominantly African American neighborhood, the Hill District, which had a profound influence on his work. Inspired from personal experiences and stories of the people around him, Wilson launched his mission to capture the struggles and triumphs of the African American Community throughout the 20th century.

Wilson's most notable achievement came with the creation of the Pittsburgh Cycle, also known as the Century Cycle, a series of ten plays set in a different decade of the 20th century to portray the African American experience in various eras. Fences, The Piano Lesson, and Ma Rainey's Black Bottom are the most notable plays. Other plays included in the Century Cycle are Gem of the Ocean, Joe Turner's Come and Gone, Jitney, King Hedley, Radio Golf, Seven Guitars, and Two Trains Running. All of these plays, except for Ma Rainey's Black Bottom, take place in Pittsburgh's Hill District.

GERTRUDE "MA" RAINEY



Often referred to as the "Mother of Blues," Gertrude "Ma" Rainey was a trailblazing African American blues singer and songwriter. Born on April 26, 1886, Ma's birth name was Gertrude Pridgett. At 14, she made her debut with a performance at the Springer Opera House. After marrying Will "Pa" Rainey, the two started touring as "Rainey and Rainey, Assassinators of The Blues.

Divorcing after 12 years, Ma continued using her stage name for the remainder of her career, which skyrocketed in the South as a solo performer. She signed with Paramount Records in 1923, which made her one of the first African American Blues singers to get a recording contract. Recording over 92 songs with Paramount, some of her hits were "Prove It On Me Blues" and "Black Eye Blues." Ma was posthumously inducted into the Blue's Foundation Hall of Fame in 1983, and the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1990.

THE LANGUAGE IN MA RAINEY



The language used in the play captures the essence of the African American experience during that period. August Wilson employs authentic vernacular and dialects, including the use of the N-word, to create a vivid and realistic portrayal of the characters and the social context they inhabit.

Using colloquial language highlights the racial tension and discrimination prevalent in the 1920s. It reflects the pervasive racism and degradation that African Americans faced during this era. The language used by the characters reveals their hardships and anger.

Wilson's intentional inclusion of the N-word in the dialogue also sparks a broader conversation about the power dynamics of language. By presenting the word in its historical context, he forces his audience to confront the discomforting realities of racism and the lasting impact of racial slurs. While some may find the language offensive or controversial, it remains essential to the play's authenticity.

MARAINEY & INSTITUTIONAL RACISM

TERMS TO KNOW

Racism: A belief or attitude that discriminates and oppresses an individual or group based on their racial or ethnic background.

Institutional Racism: The systemic practices within organizations and institutions that discriminates against certain racial or ethnic groups that result in inequality.

Explicit Institutional Racism: Deliberate discriminatory actions, policies, or practices within social institutions resulting in systemic discrimination and disparities for certain racial or ethnic groups.

Implicit Institutional Racism: Subtle biases and practices without overtly intending to discriminate within social institutions that contribute to unequal treatment. Ma Rainey's band members ask to be paid by cash because it was nearly impossible for African Americans to cash a check at the bank due to implicit institutional racism.

The music industry was no exception to institutional racism. Due to commercial radio in the early 1900s, the music business began to struggle. In 1920 Mamie Smith, an African American artist, put out a record selling more than 100,000 copies. This led to the discovery of how profitable African American music can be. Unfortunately, African American artists rarely received compensation for their work as opposed to the white musicians. Al Jolson, a white jazz artist who would perform in blackface, was worth \$10,000 per record. Ma on the other hand, was compensated \$200, with her producers wanting to reduce her pay to \$100 which led to her quitting the music industry.

The Roaring Twenties was characterized by exuberance and innovation with a booming economy and lively cultural scene. The end of World War I saw a rise in consumerism, urbanization and technological advancements that fueled the decade's distinctive spirit. However, this was also a period of contradictions with Prohibition's consequences, the Red Scare's anxieties, and the devastating impact of the stock market crash.

The 18th Amendment, also known as Prohibition, was ratified, which prohibited the sale, production, and distribution of alcoholic beverages. This Amendment intended to promote temperance and curb social issues related to alcohol. However, many unintended consequences arose, such as increased illegal production and distribution of alcohol that led to organized crime and speakeasies. This challenged the government in its attempts to regulate personal behavior.

Fears of communism and radical ideologies drove the Red Scare. There was a concern about the spread of communism throughout the United States because of the Russian Revolution and the emergence of the Soviet Union. These fears led to government raids and arrests of those suspected of being communists.

In 1929 the exuberant spirit of the decade came crashing down with the stock market crash, leading to the Great Depression. The sudden collapse of stock prices triggered a devastating economic downturn that led to financial failures, bank closures, and widespread unemployment. The 1929 crash marked the beginning of a decade-long economic downturn that profoundly affected American society.

CHICAGO IN 1927



The Great Migration was a mass movement of African Americans leaving their homes in the South for Northern cities like Chicago. With the rise of industrialization, there were more promising job prospects. African Americans sought refuge from the violent and discriminatory environment at home in the South, leading to the decision to migrate North. Once in Chicago, the majority settled down on the south side.

Although there were newfound opportunities through this Great Migration, there were still obstacles to be faced by those who migrated. Racial tensions, discriminatory housing practices, and limited access to suitable employment persisted even in the North. The promise of a better life often collided with the harsh reality that African Americans were still facing.

The social and racial tensions increased due to a tragic incident on July 27, 1919. An African American teen, Eugene Williams, was swimming in Lake Michigan when he drifted into a whites-only swimming area. A white beachgoer started throwing stones at him, eventually causing Williams to drown. The police never arrested the man responsible, further angering the African American community. This resulted in a week-long riot, where 38 people died and hundreds of others were injured.

THE BLUES



The Blues emerged in the African American communities of the Southern United States after the Civil War. Based on the experience of African Americans living in the post-slavery era, the blues served as a powerful form of artistic expression that often conveyed a deep emotional range with lyrics reflecting on the ability to overcome hard luck and adversity.

During the Great Depression, sales for Blues records sank, which led to the music style migrating North to cities like Detroit and Chicago. This led to the start of the Urban Blues, combining a mix of various regional musical styles into a polished and sophisticated sound.

The Urban Blues led to the development of new musical styles. Previously, the verse form consisted of a single line repeated four times. With the emergence of the Urban Blues, the original format switched to an AAB form. This form, also known as a 12-bar, is when the notes are played or sung at a lower/flatter pitch, which produces a more expressive and melancholy sound.
